# What is Bullying?

When someone says something unintentionally hurtful and they do it only once....

That is Not Nice

When someone says or does something intentionally hurtful and they do it once....

That is Mean

When you and your friend or two groups of friends fall out and everyone is upset....

That is Conflict



When someone says or does something intentionally hurtful and they keep doing it, over a period of time, even when you tell them to stop or show them that you are upset....

That is Bullying

# Staying Safe Online

- Think before you click or text
- People online may not be who they say they are.
- Do not share personal information...ever
- Ensure your privacy settings are activated
- Use a nickname instead of a real name
- Use an Avatar instead of your real picture
- Do not share passwords
- Do not request school staff to be friends on social media
- Block people who send horrible or inappropriate messages
- Report cyber-bullying to school.
- Do not agree to meet anyone
- Do not send any images of yourself to anyone (internet or text)
- Grooming is a real threat.

Meeting someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Always check with an adult you trust.

## **Accepting Files**

Accepting emails, files, pictures or texts from people you don't know can cause problems.

Check information before you believe it. Is the person or website telling the truth?

## **Tell Someone**

Tell an adult if someone or something makes you feel worried or uncomfortable.

- Remember: No phones on site at any time. This includes the car park on the way out of school (the biggest reason phones are confiscated)


## Sexting:

# CSE and grooming

## 1 TARGET STAGE

- 
- Doesn't matter who I choose...boy...girl...it can be anyone.... An easy target
  - Now all I need to do to is to get them to like me
  - I'll be nice to them; taking an interest; caring; giving them things
  - Get their trust
  - I may even share information about young people with other risky adults

## 2 FRIENDSHIP FORMING STAGE

- First I want to become their friend...talk to them
- Give them compliments...treat them well
- I may even give them stuff
- Spend time with them, they have my full attention
- Make them trust me

## 3 CARING RELATIONSHIP STAGE

- Build on the trust, getting them to care about me, make them think I care about them
- Make them think they are my best mate, or boy/girl friend
- Get them to believe I care about them
- Make being with me so much fun...parties alcohol...I may even give them drugs

## 4 ABUSIVE STAGE

- By now they will do anything I want
- I don't have to be nice
- I can control them, tell them what to do
- Hurt them
- Make them feel bad
- Make them do whatever I want

# Children are being exploited by gangs involved in drug crime.

## Know the signs to spot.

County lines gangs use children and vulnerable people to courier drugs and money. A young person who is involved in county lines activity might exhibit some of these signs:



Persistently going missing from school or home, or being found out-of-area



Unexplained acquisition of money, clothes or mobile phones



excessive receipt of texts or phone calls



Relationships with controlling, older individuals or gang association



Leaving home or care without explanation



Suspicion of self-harm, physical assault or unexplained injuries



Parental concerns



Significant decline in school performance



Significant changes in emotional well-being

# Prevent Project

- Radicalisation: Some young people have been lured into terrorist or extremist groups.
- Young people are at risk from adults who may wish them to join groups that are against the law.
- There are some students that may be more at risk than others
- It is about supporting as well as joining terrorist or extremist organisations
- It is a criminal offence to be part of these organisations and it is an offence for someone to try and lure children to join these groups
- If you are not sure...report it!
- Project is about early intervention to help, NOT criminalise
